TITLE: Assessing Tobacco Policy Readiness in Local Government Jurisdictions

ABSTRACT: Policy can be an effective population-based tool to reduce smoking initiation and use among both youth and adults. Successful policy promotion relies on understanding community readiness. Previous community readiness assessments for Jackson County have been ineffective in guiding Tobacco Prevention and Education Program (TPEP) policy promotion work because they (1) did not take into account the diversity of communities within the county and (2) did not assess specific policy options. In order to inform TPEP strategy development and to more effectively partner with the different governments within the county, Jackson County Public Health conducted a policy readiness assessment for each jurisdiction. An assessment tool and scoring system was created based on the Community Readiness Model and the Tobacco Control Network's Policy Readiness and Stage of Change Assessment. Use of this tool resulted in an individualized assessment of readiness and political feasibility for three areas of tobacco policy for each of the county's jurisdictions. Other counties may find a similar approach helpful in planning and prioritizing tobacco prevention activities. This presentation will cover Jackson County Public Health's experience in developing and implementing the assessment tool, lessons learned in the process, and recommendations for others seeking to assess tobacco policy readiness.
