Educational equity in Oregon

Latinos make up 24% of K-12 enrollment in Oregon, and represent one of the largestgrowing segments of higher education and the workforce.



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Parent engagement, why Juntos is different

Popular Education:

- Connection
- Trust
- Safe space
- Inclusive



Impact on parents and families

- Juntos is a safe space for parents where their knowledge is valued
- Parents observe growth in their children after completing Juntos as a family
- Parents feel more supported by the school system
- Stronger interest in school and community engagement after completing Juntos



Parent-reported impacts of Juntos

College and post-secondary access

- Parents view Juntos as a source of resources and information about college that they might not otherwise access
- Participants interested in more college-oriented content in Juntos such as college visits and financial aid information

Parent and youth college-aligned actions

School and community context

- In the past year, parents worried about their children (68%) and themselves (55%) experiencing unfair treatment
- Parents generally feel welcome at school events (80%) and that the school communicates in a way they understand (92%)





Juntos in the time of Covid-19

Delivering a relationship-driven, school-based program in 2020

- Impact of Covid-19 on student mental health and emotional needs
- Supporting the class of 2020 and current seniors
- Inequities in access to resources such as Wi-Fi and tech devices



Juntos in Fall 2020

- Adaptations vary locally based on need and capacity
- Piloting a four-week fully online workshop series
- Online student clubs
- Virtual family nights and topical programming
- Low-contact student and family mentoring (e.g., FAFSA support)
