## Abstract:

A 2010 national survey found that constituents are more influential on legislator decisions than lobbyists or news editors. As experts in their field, frontline public health professionals are well positioned to educate legislators and advocate for public health funding, yet few engage with their legislators or community members about funding needs. It will take consistent, coordinated advocacy efforts over time to fully fund a modern, statewide public health system. Some Oregon legislators are strong public health allies. Others need exposure to public health principles and education about how public health investments deliver a high return on investment in the form of lower healthcare costs, reduced disease and injuries, and improved health outcomes. In this session, learn from leaders at the Oregon Public Health Association (OPHA) and Coalition of Local Health Officials (CLHO) about what you need to know in order to more fully engage in advocacy as citizens who are public health experts and how you can partner to make the case to your legislators to support funding for needed prevention services for people throughout Oregon.
